Big Night for Tea Party: Conservative Christine O'Donnell Wins Delaware

Conservative Christine O'Donnell pulled off a stunning upset over nine-term Rep. Mike Castle in the Republican Senate primary in Delaware Tuesday, propelled by tea party activists into a November showdown with Democrat Chris Coons. After a primary season shaped by economic pain and exasperated voters, the grass-roots, anti-establishment movement can claim wins in at least seven GOP Senate races, a handful of Republican gubernatorial contests and dozens of House primary campaigns, and it influenced many others.

Bill Clinton: New-look GOP Makes Bush Look Liberal

MINNEAPOLIS – Former President Bill Clinton said Tuesday that the Republican Party is embracing "ideology over evidence" and pushing out pragmatic voices that would make even his White House successor seem like a liberal.

Clinton, speaking at a Democratic fundraiser in Minneapolis, said there was no mistaking that Republicans have tacked hard right and questioned whether former President George W. Bush would fit in among the party's candidates this year.

"A lot of their candidates today, they make him look like a liberal," Clinton told an enthusiastic crowd at a downtown hotel as he campaigned for Democratic gubernatorial candidate Mark Dayton.

"Don't Ask, Don't Tell" Policy Facing a Senate Vote Next Week

The Senate will vote next week on its version of the annual Defense Department authorization bill - a measure that includes language repealing the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy.

Aides to Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) confirmed Monday that a vote will occur next week. Potential differences between the House and Senate versions of the bill would still have to be hammered out, so final passage and a presidential signature still appear distant.

Gay rights groups are mounting an aggressive lobbying effort this week, urging supporters of the repeal (including Lady Gaga) to phone senators to urge them to vote for the military bill. But Obama's signature on the authorization bill would not end the policy outright: He would still need to certify a Pentagon study of how repealing "don't ask" might impact troop morale and readiness. The report is due to Obama and military leaders by Dec. 1. The Defense Department would move forward with repealing the policy once Obama certifies the report.

Reid Adding Amnesty Measure to Defense Bill
