If someone remarked that the interviews you conduct with distinguished guests are the most edifying and evocative on television, I would agree. Thank you.

I am of the opinion that a dark cloud hangs over Nassau Street where Princeton is located chiefly because Dr. Singer has been allowed to ply his trade there, much like a mountebank selling an elixir. Or should I say that he corrupts the youth there with no fear of having to drink the hemlock. American universities pride themselves in hiring avant-garde quacks. Every college must have one or two on their faculty. However, the voice of experience thinks differently. "I will turn from a philosopher as I would from a mad dog." [Lucian]
